#### Science 6 Students Sought Deeper Learning Through PBL

Science 6 enjoyed immersing students in PBL experiences. Each PBL experience began with a "challenging problem or question" and worked with students on "keys to success." The students then moved through the PBL essential elements, in a public product. A rocket launch, creating weather reports, solar system brochures, and natural resources guides were just a few of the PBL experiences 6th graders enjoyed.








# Math 7 Students Applied Mathematics to Everyday Situations

Foundation students applied mathematics to everyday situations this year with activities and project-based assessments that replicated re-world situation. Students experienced a restaurant-owner simulation and a consumer simulation where they worked to calculate quantities and discounts to find the better buy. They also had to stay within budget during a Velocity Wings Challenge, and they connected various representations of rational numbers to personal interest in the world around them. They illustrated models to better understand the process of solving an equation and created a probability carnival to compare theoretical and experimental probabilities.





#### World Language

The World Languages Department sponsored a school-wide HIVE Time to assist students with their upcoming foreign language class selection in February. A student-centered Choice Board was created for them to choose topics and activities to explore.

The focus was based on: Why learn a foreign language? What does it mean to be Bilingual?





### **Grade 6 English**

The sixth-grade students created Book Trailer Projects in order to inspire others to read their books. They planned the projects using a storyboard and then created videos in WeVideo or Canva. The videos were presented to the class.





#### Math 7 Students "Wall of Fame"

The year was full of math games and challenges, an engaging way to practice and refine our skills. Our champions recorded their names and accomplishments on our classroom "Wall of Fame" to display throughout the year!





# Spectrum Students Compete in National History Day Projects.


Students in 6, 7, & 8 competed in this year's theme of Frontiers in History: People, Places, Ideas. After analyzing and interpreting their sources and drawing conclusions, students presented their work in the form of a paper, exhibit, performance, website, or documentary. Students were offered the opportunity to enter their project in the regional level academic competition and move on to higher levels.

Arabella Horton entered her project, Thus a Spring was Silent, which placed 3rd at the regional level and 2nd at the state level. Arabella will move on to represent Harmony at the National Level in June 2023.



#### **Library Collaboration**

Our Librarian, Susan McGilvray, collaborated with our 6th grade Art teacher, Brenda Dowdy, on a project named "Mirror Book." Each student found a book of choice that represented their lived experiences. They used the book for inspiration and then created a painted panel using a screen leftover from Covid.







# Spectrum Students Work through Engineering Design Process

Students in grades 6 and 7 worked through the engineering design process to research, design, build, test, and iterate to build automata based on the 17th century art form as demonstrated and inspired by Maillardet's Automation currently on display in the Franklin Institute in Philadelphia. Students conceptualized an idea, created isometric drawings, built prototypes, and made modifications as necessary for the device to function. The pieces of art were displayed in an "art museum" and received feedback from peer reviewers.







#### 7th grade History - Real World Economics

Students investigated real world economics in two project-based learning activities this year. During our Big Business unit, students investigated a nation with which the United States trades. They created Google Slide decks that displayed a nation's GDP, imports and exports, and employment rate among other facts. These slide decks were published as a public product as posters and displayed outside of B-17 in the hallway. During the Great Depression unit, students took on the role of economic advisors to President Biden. They went back into the historical record to find out how Franklin D. Roosevelt's New Deal developed programs that provided relief during the Great Depression, and then they applied that information into advice for President Biden, who faced similar challenges because of the COVID pandemic. Students presented their findings to the class in the form of a congressional Hearing, where their colleagues asked them difficult questions about their conclusions. Presenting students had to "think on their feet" in their responses. This project gave students the opportunity to link the past with the present while learning about topics relevant in US Civics and Economics, the subject area they will encounter in 8th grade social studies.





#### 8th Grade National Novel Writing Month

NaNoWriMo stands for National Novel Writing Month- a worldwide challenge to write a novel in the month of November. The students learned new skills in our class lessons, including how to write and punctuate effective dialogue, use sensory details to create an immersive setting, and craft realistic, round characters. These lessons culminated in the NaNoExpo,

where they were able to learn from some of Harmony's writing experts and share their writing with one another. Collectively, Harmony students wrote over 2 million words in November!





### English 7 held a Poetry Slam

The Poetry PBL was kicked off with an introduction to the life of Edgar A. Poe with a focus on the poem, Annabel Lee. Students were shown that poetry can have a surface meaning, (literal), but oftentimes have deeper meaning sometimes based on an author's experiences. 7th graders created their own Haiku, Limerick, Rhyme Scheme, Ode, and Free Verse Poem. A class poetry slam was conducted where students voted on the best-represented poem for their block. Finally, the top students in Mr. Binford's, Ms. Butler's, and Ms. Hillebrand's class presented their poems in front of their peers. English and eighth-grade judges scored the poems, and chose the final block poetry slam winner.


### **Family Arts Night**
